Charles M. Brown, of Rome, NY, died June 22. Dr. Brown was born in Nanchang, China, the son of Methodist missionaries. His family moved back to upstate New York in the 1930's. Dr. Brown served as a captain in the Army during World War II, giving induction physicals in New York City. In 1954, Dr. Brown established his private practice and was the first board-certified surgeon in Rome, NY. While at Rome Memorial Hospital, Dr. Brown spearheaded major developments including the first surgical recovery room and the Bartlett Wing. He is survived by his wife, Dorothy; his daughters, Barbara and Reverend Helen; his sons, Charles, Reverend Gene, and Mark; ten grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Grace Montana Tillett, of Charlotte, NC, died May 12, 2007. Dr. Tillett completed an internship at Baltimore City Hospital, then completed a three-year residency and achieved board certification in radiology at Johns Hopkins Hospital. She served as chief of radiology at Fort Howard Veterans Hospital near Baltimore before moving to Charlotte in 1954. Due to discrimination against women physicians in the city at the time, she spent two years traveling to outlying areas to work, often traveling more than 150 miles per day. After the birth of her children, Tillett became trained in ophthalmology, ultimately joining her husband in practice at the Tillett Eye Clinic, where she treated patients for nearly 25 years until retirement in 1987. She was on the boards of the American Heart Association and the Dance Association and was selected for inclusion in *Who's Who in America and Who's Who in American Women*. She is survived by her husband, Charles Tillett, MD; her three children: Charles Tillett IV, Avery Tillett Ke, and James Tillett; her brother, Donald; and five grandchildren.

Sherwood V. Cohen, of Elkins Park, PA, died May 9. Dr. Cohen established a practice in Northeast Philadelphia in 1966, only to be drafted during the Vietnam War. From 1966 to 1968, he served in Army hospitals in the States. After his discharge he returned to his practice in Philadelphia, where he practiced for 35 years before retiring. He served as Chief of Ophthalmology at Kimbrough Army Hospital and consultant to First Army Headquarters at Fort Meade, Maryland.
