**Richard H. Tullis**, of La Jolla, CA, died December 18, 2006. After receiving his medical degree, Dr. Tullis enlisted in the U.S. Navy and served in WWII in the Pacific Island theaters. **Andrew D. Weinberg**, of Elgin, SC, died February 6, after a long illness.
