I know your time is tight, but I wanted to highlight for you an Oct. 26 hearing on Capitol Hill by the U.S. Senate Committee on Health, Education Labor & Pensions about "Exploring Free Speech on College Campus."

It is an illuminating discussion that addresses the question posed by committee member U.S. Sen. Patty Murray: "How can we protect this constitutional right [free speech] while also making sure our colleges and universities are places where everyone can feel safe so they can learn and respectfully debate ideas."

Sen. Murray's question is one all of us share, whether we are administrators, members of the faculty and staff or students.
