It is therefore important for me to reiterate my firm commitment to a safe and inclusive environment for all students, other trainees, faculty and staff at our university.

At present, the university is working with SUNY and others to assess the impact the executive order may have on students, faculty and staff members across our campus and those working on our behalf in other countries.

I want to echo what has been stated by SUNY and let you know that the leadership at Upstate will do all it can that is within the law to support all members of our community who may be affected by the recent executive order.

As a campus, we are strongly committed to diversity, equity and inclusion. In fact, it is our richness of diversity that allows us to be humanistic, purposeful health professionals responsive to the needs of our urban, rural and indigenous, suburban and refugee populations, and the populations we serve in other countries.
