Dear Colleagues and Friends:

What a terrific week that was. Starting with our inspirational Black History Month celebration and ending with a full schedule of Go Red Day heart healthy activities aimed at improving our employees' health and wellness, the week underscored the variety of inspiring work that academic medical institutions do every day, and the outstanding employees who do it.

Recognizing the work of all of you is important in so many ways. It helps to strengthen relationships, foster employee engagement and loyalty to our organization. I look forward to being a part of our Employee Recognition and Convocation awards and Employee Recognition Day and I encourage us all to take time and recognize the value of your colleagues.

Some of those employees are our vision researchers, who I met with last week on my tour of the Institute for Human Performance and Neurosciences Research Building. We are here for Fort Drum 90 miles away just as we are for the family down the street. What a powerful reminder of the important work we do and how much the community relies on us to be here and be the best in the delivery of excellence in health care.

Today, I will continue to put into action the engagement with our elected leaders as I travel to Albany to attend Chancellor Zimpher's budget testimony at the joint hearing of the State Senate Finance Committee and the State Assembly Ways & Means Committee. It is important that state support for SUNY is robust and that we show our communities a return on their investment.
