AMSPDC (Association of Medical School Pediatric Department Chairs, Inc) has been in existence since the 1960s. As Dr. Conners noted, "This may be the first time, certainly since 2019, that we have had more than one resident accepted in the same year."

The clinics do this by monitoring a gamut of reports for different indicators such as access to care, time of return call to patients, AAPs printed, etc. We then complete many QI activities to assure better outcomes and provide excellent care to our patients and families. Everyone who walks into each of these clinics is a part of PCMH, from the faculty, residents, APPs, clinical and clerical staff to the Environmental Services staff. We couldn't be prouder of this recognition!"

### In the News – A Breakthrough Device Our very own Dr. William Sullivan, who is



the director of **Outpatient Behavioral** Services at the Golisano Center for Special Needs was headlined in the last Upstate Update for having launched a study to assess how a novel technology called

transcranial photobiomodulation (tPBM) may be used to help children with autism. It involves the use of a non-invasive headband medical device that crosses the wearer's forehead and falls just over the tops of their ears. It has been designated by the FDA as a breakthrough device. Dr. Williams stated that "Preliminary evidence has shown that this therapy can improve behavioral symptoms of ASD by stimulating targeted brain areas that activate mitochondria, reduce brain inflammation, and improve functional brain connectivity. Independent scientific research, however, is needed to support those claims". In an exclusive interview. Dr. Sullivan tells the Crier, "This is an exciting new technology that I am eager to investigate here at Upstate. We have partnered with Dr. Alex Kolevzon, the Director of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry and Clinical Director of the Seaver Autism Center for Research and Treatment at Mount Sinai, to run a concurrent clinical trial. We are actively recruiting

Our very own Winter Berry was quoted in the New York Times article entitled, "New drugs can fix teenage obesity, but young people don't get them" (published on 12/11/23). The article deals with weight loss drugs for adolescents. It states that "much about how the drugs work is unknown, and long-term effects may be different when treatment starts in adolescence. That's a concern for Dr. Winter Berry, a pediatrician in private practice in Syracuse, New York, who worries about 'the dearth of data' on long-term use. She said that she and other pediatricians were not philosophically opposed to prescribing [weight loss drugs]. But, she said, 'we want to do it well. My colleagues and I feel we are not there yet'."
