Summer Safety 2023

All New Yorkers can agree that New York State is beautiful in the summer! Take a look at our summer safety video highlighting:

- food safety tips
- mushrooms and berries found in nature
- insecticide application
- pool chemical safety & storage
- tiki torch fluid use
- bug spray and sunscreen application
- alcohol and cannabis use & safe storage

Remember to call us in a poison emergency or if you have questions about any of the above summertime staples.



The Upstate New York Poison
Center is seeing a sharp increase in calls for young children swallowing a cannabis-related product. Many times a child mistook a form of edible (gummy, candy, or baked good) for a piece of candy. Last year, our center handled just shy of 700 cases for cannabis products (overdose, ingestion or for information). A majority of those calls were for children 5 and under swallowing some form of edible cannabis. Kids don't stop at one and don't know dosage.

To avoid accidental poisoning, have a storage plan for cannabis products:

- Keep cannabis in a secure and locked place. Cannabis products should be up high and out of sight and reach of children and pets. Consider using a safe or lock box.
- Store cannabis products in their original containers and keep the label.
 Labels on cannabis products from licensed cannabis establishments will have important information including how much THC is in the product.
- 3. Be sure to store cannabis products away from all other household items.
- 4. If someone is visiting your home or watching your child or pet in your home or theirs, talk to them about locking up their cannabis.
- 5. Make a list of cannabis products in your home. Knowing exactly what

cannabis products and how many you have can help with medical treatment in case of accidental ingestion.

Call the Upstate New York Poison Control Center at <u>1-800-222-1222</u> right away if you think a child might have ingested cannabis. We are available 24/7/365 and we are free & confidential.





In Erie County, three coalitions joined forces to deliver programming on 'Safe Medication Use' to seniors in their communities. Coordinators from Springville, Amherst and Iroquios combined their efforts by bringing together their members, including high school students, to establish the 'Support Student Safety (S3) Coalition.' One of the goals of this joint effort was to empower youth as leaders in their

poison safety or would like to see your coalition's work featured.

communities. Medication safety was a topic of concern and seniors quickly became a target audience. After receiving Poison Center training from Mary Beth Dreyer, and leadership training from Colleen Kumiega from Hilbert College, high school students working along with coalition leader's guidance, developed a 30-45 minute presentation on safe use, safe storage and safe disposal of medication. Participants receive material from the S3 Coalition, along with medication lock boxes provided by the Upstate New York Poison Center. 
