## UH receives award for its stroke care

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University Hospital has received the American Stroke Association's Get With The Guidelines— Stroke Bronze Performance Achievement Award. The award recognizes University Hospital for its commitment and success in implementing a higher standard of stroke care by ensuring that stroke patients receive treatment according to nationally accepted standards and recommendations.

"With a stroke, time lost is brain lost and this achieve-

ment award addresses the important element of time," saidTarakadS.Ramachandran, MD, professor of neurology and stroke director at University Hospital.

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In 2006 University Hospital became central New York's first hospital to receive Stroke Center designation from the New York Department of State Health. The centerpiece of University Hospital's stroke center designation is its stroke team of physicians, pharmacists, technicians, nurses and administrators who mobilize quickly to provide rapid medical diagnosis and treatment of stroke patients.

## University Hospital is first in state with new imaging device in OR

University Hospital is the first hospital in New York State to use a revolutionary new imaging system that provides physicians with unprecedented views of patient anatomy in the operating room, during the surgical procedure.

"This real time access improves accuracy and enables us to employ more minimally invasive techniques," said neurosurgeon Ross Moquin MD, the first University Hospital surgeon to use the system. "Our immediate access to highresolution, 3D images results in decreased collateral damage such as incision size and blood loss."

"The system is particularly useful in spinal deformity or scoliosis surgery," Dr. Moquin said. "The spine is often so deformed that normal landmarks are not clearly visible. With the Oarm, we have an immediate, accurate view of patient anatomy and instrument placement."

"Prior to completing the procedure, we can obtain a post-operative scan, while the patient is still open and *continued on page 6*

## SUNY Upstate faculty present at international video conference on VCFS

Several faculty members from SUNY Upstate Medical University presented at an international video conference transmitted from the 15th Annual International Scientific Meeting of The Velo-Cardio-Facial Syndrome Educational Foundation in Detroit July 20 to three sites in the Middle East. Kevin Antshel, PhD, assistant professor of psychiatry and behavioral sciences and Robert J. Shprintzen, PhD, professor of otolaryngology and professor of pediatrics, presented data from the SUNY Upstate experience with velo-cardiofacial syndrome (VCFS) to remote sites in Israel, the West Bank and Jordan. The program was the first of its kind using VCFS as a mechanism for

"University Hospital has a comprehensive system for rapid diagnosis and treatment of stroke patients admitted to the emergency department. This includes always being equipped to provide brain imaging scans, having neurologists available round the clock to conduct patient evaluations, using clot-busting medications intravenously, and also intrarterially at the site of the clot when appropriate. In addition we are capable of retrieving and removing the clot(s) when indicated," said Dr. Ramachandran.

To receive the GWTG-Stroke Bronze Performance Achievement Award, University Hospital consistently followed the treatment guidelines in the GWTG-Stroke program for 90 days. These include aggressive use of medications like tPA, antithrombotics, anticoagulation therapy, DVT prophylaxis, cholesterol reducing drugs, and smoking cessation. The 90-day evaluation period is the first in an ongoing self-evaluation by the hospital to continually reach the 85 percent compliance level needed to sustain this award.

"The American Stroke Association commends University Hospital for its success in implementing standards of care and protocols," said Lee H. Schwamm, MD, national Get With The Guidelines Steering Committee member and director of the acute stroke services at Massachusetts General Hospital in Boston. "The full implementation of acute care and secondary prevention recommendations and guidelines is a critical step in saving the lives and



## New Kronos Time and Attendance and Nurse Scheduling System to begin

Payroll Services and Nursing-Patient Support Services have begun implmentation of the new Kronos Time and Attendance and Scheduling system implementation. This joint project will result in an advanced scheduling system and a superior time system for the following SUNY Upstate employees:

- CSEA-represented;
- PEF-represented;
- Non-exempt UUP-represented;
- Non-exempt Council 82-repre-

sented;

• Non-exempt Research Foundation (excluding hourly) employees;

- Student Assistants; and
- Temporary agency staff.

PEF and UUP-represented staff may now enter their time directly to the Kronos system via their computer. All others will use time clocks to record time worked. Test groups, including, but not limited to, Payroll Services, Human Resources, Physical Plant, and Environmental Services - Campus and Hospital, began using the new Kronos time system between July and September. Test groups for the Scheduling and Time Keeping begin this month.These test groups include 6I, 4N/C, Adult Float Teams, and the 3NOR. As the rollout progresses, departments will be contacted in advance to prepare for their transition to Kronos.
